#### Bulk Pick-Up

Bulk waste is defined by the Village as "miscellaneous waste material of such size as is not normally collected with garbage, including but not limited to furniture, plumbing fixtures, manufactured-processed wood or wood by-products, and small amounts of concrete waste not exceeding a five-gallon bucket in volume." Bulk does **not** include appliances, electronics, gas powered equipment, or cardboard.

#### Brush Pick-Up

Brush is defined by the Village as limbs and branches from trees and shrubs. Brush does **not** include tree roots, root balls, yard waste, leaves, or grass.

#### Spring / Fall Clean-Up

Spring / Fall Clean-Up is the collection of leaves and yard waste which is defined by the Village as "all materials originating in the yard and garden which are capable of natural decomposition (e.g. leaves, plants, flowers, etc.)". Grass is not permitted.

The last day to put leaves/yard waste to the curb for pick-up.

## DEAR FELLOW ALLOUEZNIANS,

As I reflect on all we have achieved in 2025 and look ahead to what lies before us in 2026, I am filled with pride for our community and excitement for the future we are building together. Allouez continues to be a place where young adults can start their careers, where families can raise their children, and where seniors can enjoy a fulfilling retirement. Together, we are turning our shared vision into reality—a vision that includes mixed-use housing, a welcoming village center district, and thriving local businesses that serve as the heart of our community.

### Public Works Highlights

The Public Works Department had a productive year keeping our Village safe, efficient, and looking its best! Crews rebuilt or resurfaced 2.2 miles of local streets, replaced 3,000 feet of sanitary sewer, and upgraded 6,500 feet of watermain. Another 4,900 feet of sewer pipe were lined to extend service life. Partnering with Brown County, the team improved the Webster and Greene Avenue intersection with ADA-accessible ramps, new crosswalk markings, and rapid flashing beacons—making it safer for pedestrians.

A leak detection survey helped identify and repair 11 water system leaks, returning usage to normal. Plans were also approved by the DNR to replace two water storage reservoirs, and lead service line replacements continued. Public Works added a trailer-mounted hot box for cold-weather asphalt repairs, replaced two aging garbage trucks, and renovated office space to better serve staff and residents. The department also supported utility planning for the Haven Way Condominiums and replaced a major stormwater outfall to the Fox River.

### Parks, Recreation, & Forestry Highlights

This past year brought exciting improvements to our Allouez parks. The shelter at Eastlawn Park was completely renovated, featuring accessible restrooms and a rentable event space for community gatherings. We also partnered with Kayak Wisconsin to install a kayak rental kiosk at Kayaker's Point along the Fox River—making it easier than ever to explore the water. A second kiosk is planned for Eastlawn Park on the East River in 2026. In addition, staff completed the Memorial Garden at Green Isle Park, where residents can honor loved ones

with engraved paver bricks.

Looking ahead to 2026, the PHM-Webster Park playground will be replaced with modern equipment, and the Village will update its Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan, inviting residents to share ideas for the future of Allouez parks. The department will also continue offering family-friendly events and bus trips, including Pooches & Pints, Music in the Park, Movie in the Park, and excursions to Strawberryfest, Lake Geneva, Chicago, and Milwaukee Brewers games.

### Community Development Highlights

2025 has been a year of exciting progress and positive change for Allouez! The Village reorganized its Planning Department to strengthen building inspection services and create a part-time Community Engagement Coordinator—enhancing our ability to connect with residents and businesses, all without increasing the department budget. We also created the Allouez Community Development Authority (CDA), giving the Village new tools to help guide future growth and revitalization efforts.

This year brought several major accomplishments, including the restart of the Haven Way Condominium project on the Northeast corner of Libal and St. Joseph, completion of the beautiful Somerville office building on Riverside Dr., new business openings, and multiple new home starts. Our efforts to close GBCI (the prison) are moving forward. The State of Wisconsin included \$15 million into the budget to start the planning for the closure. Looking ahead, we're excited about proposed projects along Webster Avenue, including a multi-level mixed-use development with Allouez Development Group, LLC that will bring new apartments and retail space to the community.

As we prepare to launch our first-ever Allouez Wish Book and enter 2026 with a full, energized team, the future is bright for Allouez—filled with new opportunities to grow, connect, and build upon the strong foundation of our village.

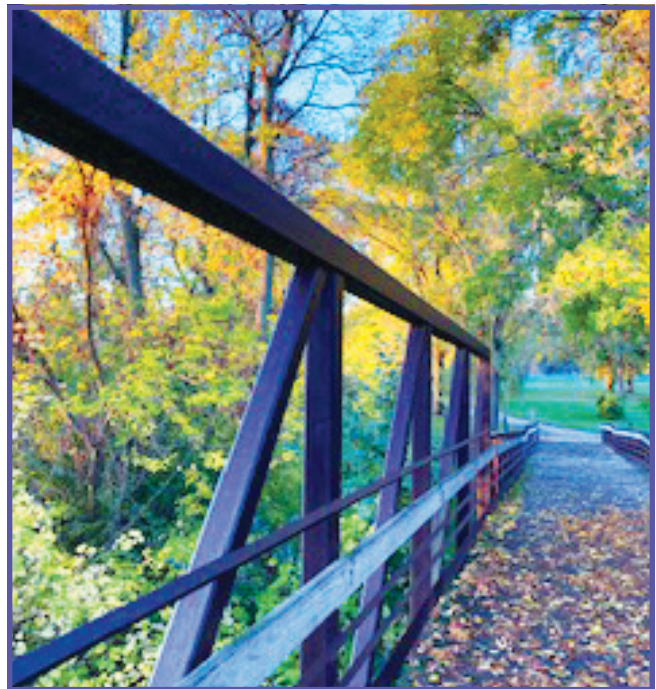
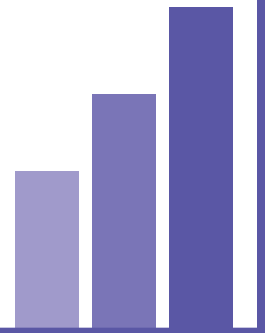

## ALLOUEZ MUNICIPAL COURT

The Allouez Municipal Court convenes at 1:00 p.m. on the third and fourth Wednesday of each month to adjudicate traffic and ordinance violations alleged within the Village. The Court processes approximately 1,500 violations annually and nearly 1,000 follow up actions concerning driver license status, vehicle registration, and forfeiture collection. Through the imposition of monetary civil forfeitures, the Court generates revenues annually, serving as a deterrent, ensuring the safety and welfare of Allouez Citizens. Infractions that are processed range from traffic and zoning violations, to offenses against public peace, safety and welfare.

The Village of Allouez does not maintain a police department, but rather contracts with the Brown County Sheriff's Office for the enforcement and investigation of all violations of law. Sheriff Todd Delain has designated Chief Deputy Brad Brodbeck as Police Chief of the Village. All violations and/or incidents requiring police involvement should be reported to the Sheriff's Office, located in Brown County.

The Village also contracts with the Sheriff's Office for a directed enforcement police officer. Deputy Jason Vogel serves in this role. His position was created to focus on community policing.

Prevention & community risk reduction play a significant role in the fire service. There are numerous ways we can reduce the risk of fires and injuries in our community. One of the most noticeable ways is through our fire inspection program. You may often see fire trucks or ambulances at businesses; this is because the crews are conducting fire inspections to ensure high levels of fire safety. Our trained personnel identify and address fire hazards within buildings that could pose a threat to occupants. This is not done to be bothersome, but rather to prevent significant events from occurring. Another prevention method is assigning a dedicated Lieutenant to oversee community life safety education. This officer collaborates with schools, especially during Fire Prevention Week in October, and with community services such as the Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC) and the Center for Childhood Safety. The leading cause of fires in our area is unattended cooking, which can be easily prevented by staying in the kitchen. Our most frequent type of call is related to falls. In Brown County, there are 33 falls reported each day from our emergency medical services and local Emergency Rooms. 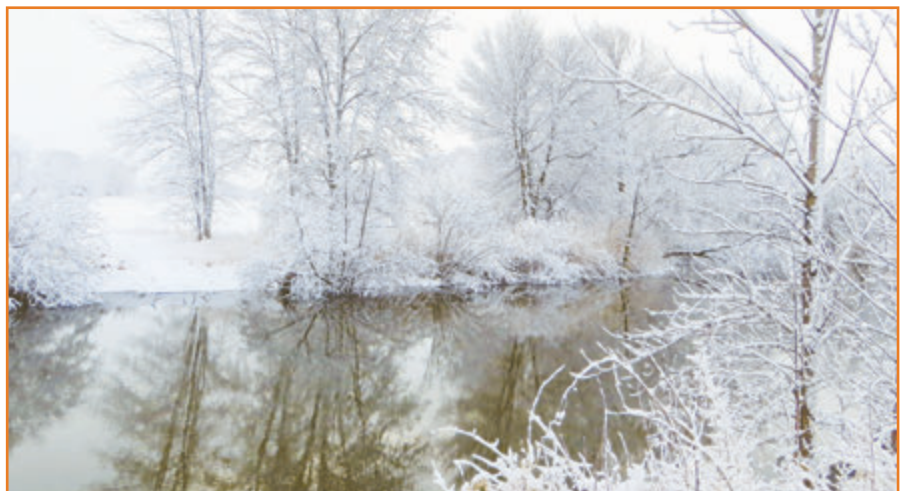
Most construction projects require a building permit. Our Building Inspector is required to inspect projects to ensure compliance with the State of Wisconsin Uniform Dwelling Code (UDC) and local village codes.

The list below is not all-inclusive of every project that needs or does not need a permit. If you have any questions regarding whether or not a project requires a permit, contact the Building Inspector using the information listed above.

PROJECTS THAT ALWAYS NEED A PERMIT	
Additions to existing structures on property, interior renovations or finishing of existing space, altering or adding walls and windows.	Electrical additions, replacements, or renovations
Foundation repair and stabilization	Electrical panel changes and electrical service upgrades.
Building new exterior structures including, but not limited to: garages, decks, sheds, fences, gazebos and pergolas.	Solar panel, generator, and electric vehicle charger installations.
Replacing siding or structural components to a roof.	Plumbing additions, replacements, or renovations.
Heating, ventilation, and air conditioning (HVAC) component addition, replacement, or renovation.	Installation of in and above ground pools

The WI UNIFORM PERMIT APPLICATION is used for all building projects. This application and the list of fees associated with different projects can be found on the Village website or obtained in person at the Village Hall.

As a reminder, please provide advanced notice when scheduling building inspections. One full business day is the minimum required time to provide notice but a week is preferred so inspections can be properly coordinated.





## PARKING RULES IN THE VILLAGE OF ALLOUEZ

### ON STREET PARKING:

No street parking on your scheduled day of garbage pick up. April 1-November 15 (6:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m.)

Street parking ban due to general street cleaning.

**These parking bans are STRICTLY ENFORCED; No Warnings Given.**

Violators will be ticketed \$20.00 and have five calendar days to pay the fine. If the fine is not paid within five calendar days, the fine increases to \$30.00. After 11 calendar days the fine will increase to \$40.00. After 30 calendar days, the fine is \$55.00 and a suspension of your plates and registration will be issued & sent to the D.O.T.



## HANDICAP PARKING

Handicap parking violators will be ticketed \$200.00 for parking in a handicap spot without the proper identification displayed.



### Bicycle License

Bike licenses are available at Village Hall for no fee. A description of the bicycle (make, model, color and serial number) must be supplied when you register for a license. Obtaining a bike license can greatly increase your chance of finding a lost or stolen bike.

### Bicycling in Allouez

The Village has many great places to bicycle in our community, including the Fox River & East River trails. Bicyclists are allowed to bicycle on all village streets and are required to ride with traffic. The only sidewalk in Allouez bicyclists are allowed to ride on is Webster Avenue. When riding on the sidewalk, always ride the same direction as the adjacent traffic and safely enter intersections. Vehicle drivers should always watch for bicyclists and pedestrians entering the intersection from the sidewalk.

Remember to always wear a helmet when bicycling. BE SAFE! BE SEEN! Wear reflective clothing, have a white front light and red back light on your bike when riding after dark.

**Beekeeping:** \$30.00 initial fee / \$10.00 renewal / \$60.00 late fee

Stray Animals are brought to the Wisconsin Humane Society: 1830 Radisson Street, Green Bay, WI 54302 – phone number: 920-469-3110. The owner is responsible for paying all fees incurred for the care of the animal.

## Pet Care

**Pet Waste:** It is unlawful to permit a pet to defecate upon any property other than its owner or custodian unless it is immediately picked up and disposed of. Pet waste, including cat litter, can be placed in your garbage cart for collection if double bagged.

**Pets Leashed:** Any animal allowed to leave the boundaries of the property of the owner or custodian shall be under the immediate control of a person by means of leash which is not more than six feet in length and which is of sufficient strength to control the actions of the animal.



## CODE ENFORCEMENT:

The Humane Officer, or another Brown County Officer will be dispatched to verify your complaint.

## WILDLIFE ISSUES

• **Feeding: Bird feeders are allowed, however, feeding wildlife such as deer, ducks, or other animals that are not your pet, is not allowed.**

• Free Program for Wild Cats: Village of Allouez in partnership with the Wisconsin Humane Society and Cats Anonymous offers TNR(trap/neuter/return) as an option when dealing with stray/feral cats and/or barn cats.

• Trapping is only legal on your own property (unless you have a DNR trapping license and follow DNR regulations.)

• If you decide to trap you must check your trap daily and remove the animal

- Do not release animals on public property or on private property without the permission of the property owner
- Do not trap in spring or summer or you may create baby animal orphans that will starve to death without their mother!
- Do not leave traps set at night unless you are prepared to deal with a skunk in your trap!
- Do not set mouse or rat traps outside, as they may endanger larger animals.
- It is against the law and dangerous to keep wild animals, even if you plan on releasing them.

## VILLAGE PARTICIPATES IN COMMUNITY RATING SYSTEM

The Village continues to maintain a CRS Class 6 rating, providing residents who are required to have flood insurance with a 20% discount on their flood insurance.

The Insurance Service Office monitors the CRS program and requires communities to complete specific tasks each year to retain their rating. Staff must provide community outreach, education, technical advice and assistance, and maintain and provide floodplain documents to residents upon request.

Be sure to ask your insurance agent for the flood insurance discount.

## BROWN COUNTY PLANNING DEPARTMENT SERVES VILLAGE AS FLOODPLAIN ADMINISTRATOR

The Village contracts with Brown County Planning for Floodplain Administration. Matt Heyroth, Assistant Zoning Administrator is filling this role for the village. In his absence, anyone in the Planning and Land Services Office may answer your questions. Staff will investigate reported flooding and drainage concerns and will conduct site visits upon request.

Is my home in the floodplain? What do I have to do to put an addition on my home in the floodplain? How do I go about getting a LOMA (Letter of Map Amendment)? Do I need flood insurance? These and any other floodplain questions, or information on how to get your discount should be directed to Matt.

## DRAINAGE SYSTEM MAINTENANCE

As simple as it sounds, keeping storm sewer inlets & drainage ditches free of debris can dramatically improve the run-off capacity of low lying areas, as well as greatly reduce the occurrence blockage that significantly contributes to flooding. It is a violation of Village ordinance to dump or throw waste into storm sewer inlets & drainage ditches. Do your part by placing leaves and branches on your lawn next to the curb, during designated pick-up times - **NOT IN THE STREET**. Village staff regularly check storm sewers and drainage ditches to ensure they are clear & able to handle the runoff.

***Violators can be issued a citation.***

## FLOODPLAIN PERMIT REQUIREMENTS

All development within the 100 year floodplain (not only construction of buildings, but filling, excavation, fences etc.) is required to obtain a building permit. Applications must be made prior to doing any work in a floodplain area. Please contact the Building Inspector to receive the information you will need to properly develop in the floodplain. You may report any illegal development activities to the Building Inspector.

## WASHING AWAY FLOOD INSURANCE MYTHS

There are many myths that persist about flood insurance. The main article for the 2019 Floodplain Newsletter is focused on identifying some of the most common misconceptions when it comes to flood insurance and provide some straightforward explanations of what is really true.

### **MYTH: My homeowner's insurance covers flooding.**

This may be the most prevalent misinformation of all. In fact, almost no homeowner's insurance policies cover flood damage. That is why the federal government created the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). Flood insurance is sold as a separate policy, so even if a person's regular agent doesn't handle flood insurance, it can be obtained from another agent who serves that area. To find an agent, contact the NFIP call center at 800-427-4661 or visit their website at <https://www.FloodSmart.gov/>.

### **MYTH: I don't need flood insurance, because I'm not in a high-risk zone.**

The reality is that it can flood almost anywhere, and it doesn't take much water to cause expensive damage. In fact, about 1/3 of all flood disaster assistance and 1/3 of all flood insurance claims payments go to people who have been flooded even though they were outside of the mapped high-risk zone (Special Flood Hazard Area). With a changing climate, scientists say that extreme weather events – like the storms experienced in 2020 – will be more likely in the future. Living in a location that has been thought to be at low risk does not mean that it will not flood.

### **MYTH: I can't get flood insurance, because I'm not in a high-risk zone.**

Virtually anyone who lives in or owns property in an NFIP-participating community can buy flood insurance for a residential building, business, condo, or apartment, and the contents can be insured as well (or instead). Flood insurance through the NFIP has never been restricted to people located in the high-risk zone (Special Flood Hazard Area). In fact, for people outside the high-risk zone, flood insurance is an even better deal because the premiums are lower. An overview of the availability, coverage, and costs of flood insurance – in clear language and with sources of more information – can be found on

the Flood Smart website <https://www.floodsmart.gov/costs/why-am-i-paying-this-amount>.

### **MYTH: Even if my house did flood, it wouldn't be by much.**

There may not be very much water, but that doesn't mean there won't be much damage. Only one inch of water in an average home can cause more than \$25,000 in damage. FEMA has developed an interactive tool to help people see how the depth of flooding translates to damage costs. Check out this tool at <http://www.floodsmart.gov/costOfFlooding/index.html>.

### **MYTH: I don't need flood insurance because FEMA gives disaster assistance.**

The truth is that FEMA can only provide disaster assistance when the president issues a disaster declaration – this happens for less than half of all floods. Even if there is a disaster declaration, FEMA can only provide small grants, not enough to cover all losses and certainly not enough to rebuild. For example, in Hurricane Harvey the average individual grant FEMA distributed was only \$7,000. Most other federal disaster assistance comes in the form of loans, which must be repaid. By contrast, in Hurricane Harvey, the average NFIP claim payment was over \$100,000 – that's a payment from the insurance policy and of course never has to be repaid. And, a flood insurance policy pays for any covered damage, even if it results from a small (not disastrous) flood.

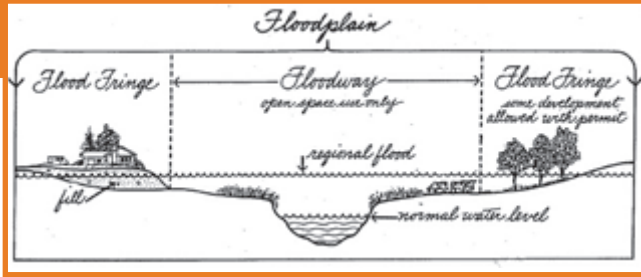

## DEFINITIONS

### **Know these definitions for when the next flood hits:**

**Surface water flooding:** Flooding due to increased flow volumes in river and stream beds reaching over their banks, increased flow volumes released from breached dams and impoundments, high volumes of overland flow (runoff), or increased recharge causing lake water levels to rise over their normal shorelines.

**Ground water flooding:** Flooding due to increased recharge causing the water table to rapidly rise, either forcing water to flood above the ground surface, or to force water by hydraulic pressure through cracks and crevices and into basements.



**Safe water supply:** Drinking water is considered to be “safe” when it is determined to be free of coliform bacteria by a certified laboratory following approved standard methods.

**Flood Watch:** Flooding is possible in the flood watch area. Tune in to NOAA Weather Radio, commercial radio, or television for information.

**Flash Flood Watch:** Flash flooding is possible in the flood watch area. Be prepared to move to higher ground; listen to NOAA Weather Radio, commercial radio, or television for information.

**Flood Warning:** Flooding is already occurring or will occur soon in the warning area. If advised to evacuate, do so immediately.

**Flash Flood Warning:** Flash flooding is already occurring in the flood warning area. Seek higher ground on foot immediately.

**Floodplain:** Most floodplain regulations apply to the 1% annual chance (also known as the 100-year) floodplain. The floodplain is made of of two parts – the floodway and the flood fringe.

**Floodway:** The inner portion of the floodplain. The floodway is the channel of a river or stream, and those portions of the floodplain adjoining the channel required to carry the regional flood discharge. The floodway is the most dangerous part of the floodplain since it is associated with moving water.

**Flood fringe:** The area of the floodplain outside of the floodway. This area is covered by flood water during the regional flood. The flood fringe is generally associated with standing water rather than flowing water. It is also the part of the floodplain in which some development is allowed subject to the floodplain development standards.

## FLOOD SAFETY

**The following guidelines can help prepare you for flood conditions.**

If flooding in your area is likely:

- Contact Brown County Health Department (877-619-9221) to familiarize yourself with community emergency plans.

- Speak to your insurance company about flood coverage.
  - List emergency numbers and contacts near phones.
  - If you live in a flood zone, raise electrical components, furnace, and water heater above flood zone level.
  - Install backflow valves for drains, toilets, and other sewer connections.
  - Install sump pumps with back-up power
- In the case of a flood watch or warning:
- Gather emergency supplies (see previous page).
  - Stay informed – listen to local weather reports.
  - If time allows, bring outdoor possessions indoors and secure them and fill bathtubs, sinks, and plastic bottles with clean water.
  - Do not walk through water. If water levels begin to rise, immediately seek higher ground.
  - Prepare for evacuation:
    - Make transportation plans and fill gas tank.
    - Check with friends, family, neighbors that may be isolated/unaware of the situation.
    - Collect important documents (e.g. ID cards, insurance cards, and medical records).

In the case of an ordered evacuation:

- Turn off the gas, electricity, and water.
- Disconnect appliances.
- Gather emergency supplies.
- Listen to evacuation orders and follow evacuation route.
- Avoid flood zones and remain informed by listening to weather reports.

## GARBAGE / RECYCLING

Collection schedule is located on page 2.

### Garbage is collected weekly:

Monday-Thursday

### Recycling is collected every-other-week:

Monday-Thursday

### Garbage/Recycling Pick-Up Guidelines

- Garbage/recycling carts must be at the curb by 6:00 a.m. on your collection day, but no sooner than 6:00 p.m. the day before.
- Residents must use the gray cart for garbage, and may use either the blue or green carts for recycling.
- Garbage must be bagged and must fit in the garbage container so as to allow the lid to close.
- Place single stream recyclables loosely in the recycling container with lid closed. Do not put plastic bags in the recycling bin.
- Keep carts at least four (4) feet apart and four (4) feet from any fixed structure (mailbox, trees, cars, utility poles, etc.).
- Remove carts from the curb by midnight on your collection day.
- When not at the curb, carts may not be stored in front of any building, house, or garage visible from the street.

### Damaged Garbage/ Recycling Carts

Carts were purchased by the Village for each residential property in 2004. They have exceeded their life expectancy after years of regular use, frigid temperatures and harsh sunlight. Going forward, as carts begin to break down, it is the responsibility of the property owner to purchase a new cart from the Village.

The cost of a new cart is \$70.00 each. They can be purchased online or in person at Village Hall. Once paid for, carts will be delivered to you.

### Is This Recyclable?

Betterbin and the Waste Wizard are online recycling resources provided by Tri-County Recycling.

They take the guesswork out of recycling by providing a local search engine to determine if and how an item is recycled in Brown County.

## BULK WASTE PICK-UP

Large items up to two (2) cubic yards, or in general, one (1) front-end loader full (see image below), will be picked up at no charge on your garbage day during the scheduled bulk pick-up weeks.

**Items not accepted for bulk pick-up should be properly disposed of at the Brown County Port & Resource Recovery Facilities and/or a private licensed facility.**

### Steps to ensure pick up during Bulk Week:

- Only place acceptable items out for collection.
- Place bulk waste behind the curb. Do not place anything in the street.
- Keep bulk piles as compact as possible within two (2) cubic yards.  
Stack items to allow for efficient pick-up.
- Keep bulk waste no less than four (4) feet away from any fixed structure (mailbox, trees, cars, utility poles, etc.).
- Bulk waste must be out for collection by 6:00 a.m. on your garbage day, but no sooner than 6:00 p.m. the day before.

## 2026 BULK/BRUSH COLLECTION SCHEDULES

Beginning in 2026, the bulk and brush collection schedule will change. The schedule is designed to allot more time for the maintenance and repair of Village streets and utilities, while still providing exceptional collection services.

Throughout the past year Village staff members examined past collection data and compared surrounding municipal services to create an optimized schedule. Once drafted, the schedule was brought to the Public Works Committee and Village Board for approval under a two-year pilot program.

As in the past, the Public Works Director may authorize additional residential bulk or brush pick up in specific areas of the Village if warranted by a storm event. This will be announced on our website and Facebook page.

Between pickups, the Lebrun Yard Waste Site (pg. 23) is open 24/7 for residents to drop off brush and yard waste. Bulk waste can be taken to the Brown County Transfer Station (pg. 23).

Thank you for your understanding and patience as we all adjust to the new schedule. Full schedules can be viewed on pages 2 & 3.

If the amount of bulk placed to the curb during collection week exceeds two (2) cubic yards, the additional bulk will be picked up for a charge of \$25.00 per each additional cubic yard. The property owner will be invoiced the cost for an additional pick-up.

### Non-Collection Weeks:

Any bulk items placed on the curb during a non-pick up week will be tagged with a forty-eight (48) hour notice to remove. If the items are not removed, the Village will pick up and bill the property owner for collection and disposal at a minimum cost of \$200.

A resident may request bulk waste collection during a non-collection week, such as renter move-out. The minimum pick-up charge during a non-collection week is \$200. Any unpaid charges will be placed on the real estate tax bill as a special charge. Contact Village Hall at 920-448-2800 to schedule pick-up during a non-collection week.

## BRUSH PICK-UP

Collection schedule is located on page 3.

Brush piles no larger than eight (8) feet long and six (6) feet deep will be picked up at no charge on your garbage day during scheduled brush pick-up weeks.

### Brush is defined by the Village as:

Limbs and branches from trees and shrubs.

**Brush does not include tree roots or root balls, yard waste, leaves, or grass.**

### Steps to ensure pick up during Brush Week:

- Only place brush, as defined by the Village, out for collection.
- Place brush parallel to and behind the curb. Do not place anything in the street.
- Keep brush piles within the required size parameters (no larger than 8 ft. long x 6 ft. deep).
- Keep brush no less than four (4) feet away from any fixed structure (mailbox, trees, cars, utility poles, etc.).
- Brush must be out for collection by 6:00 a.m. on your garbage day, but no sooner than 6:00 p.m. the day before.
- The Village will not collect brush created by a contracted service.

### Non-Collection Weeks:

Residents are encouraged to bring brush to Lebrun Yard Waste Site located at 911 Lebrun Street, Green Bay, WI 54301. Lebrun Yard Waste Site is open 24/7 for Allouez resident use only.

Any brush placed on the curb during a non-pick up week will be tagged with a forty-eight (48) hour notice to remove. If the items are not removed, the Village will pick up and bill the property owner for collection and disposal at a minimum cost of \$200.

A resident may request brush pick-up during a non-collection week. The minimum pick-up charge during a non-collection week is \$200. If the amount exceeds the volume of the Village haul truck, there will be a \$200 charge for each additional truck load. Any unpaid charges will be placed on the real estate tax bill as a special charge. Contact Village Hall at 920-448-2800 to schedule pick-up during a non-collection week.





## SPRING / FALL CLEAN-UP

Collection schedule found at beginning of guide on page 3.

Twice a year, in spring and fall, the Village designates a few weeks to leaf and yard waste collection.

### Yard Waste is defined by the Village as:

All materials originating in the yard and garden which are capable of natural decomposition (e.g. leaves, plants, flowers, etc.)

**Yard Waste does not include brush, stumps, woody stalks, green grass, tree roots, or root balls.**

### Steps to ensure pick up during Spring and Fall Clean-Up:

- Only place leaves and yard waste, as defined by the Village, out for collection.
- Place leaf and yard waste piles behind the curb. Do not place anything in the street.
- Be patient. Unlike bulk and brush collection, leaf and yard waste collection is continuous and does not follow a set schedule. Village crews try to pass through the Village every 6 to 7 working days (number of days may fluctuate depending on the volume of waste placed out for collection.).
- The Village will not collect leaves or yard waste created by a contracted service.

Residents are encouraged to bring yard waste and leaves to the Lebrun Yard Waste Site located at 911 Lebrun Street, Green Bay, WI 54301. Lebrun Yard Waste Site is open 24/7 for Allouez resident use **only**.

## SNOW PLOWING

### Streets

The Village plans snow and ice removal activities for each weather event to provide safe travel conditions to residents. Below are the general practices followed by the Village in response to winter weather events.

#### General Practices:

**Snow accumulation of three (3) inches or more:**

Streets are plowed.

**Snow accumulation less than three (3) inches:**

Salt applied at intersections and on streets with steep grades.\*

\* The Village will apply salt on all Village streets if an ice storm or icing conditions warrant.

### Sidewalk

#### Village Assistance:

- (1) The Village of Allouez will assist property owners as follows with the clearing of snow from public sidewalk:
  - (a) After each snowfall event, the Village will clear sidewalks adjacent to roundabouts and problem area sidewalks. See the Village Sidewalk Clearing Map.
  - (b) Six inches of snowfall or more: The Village will clear all other contiguous sidewalks as shown on the Village Sidewalk Clearing Map. **Less than six inches of snowfall: It is the property owner's responsibility to clear snow and ice from the sidewalk.**

Residents are reminded that snow and ice must be removed from their sidewalks within 48 hours after a winter storm. If ice remains on the sidewalk, it must be salted or sanded. If not cleared after 48 hours, the following actions are taken:

#### Non-Compliance Penalty:

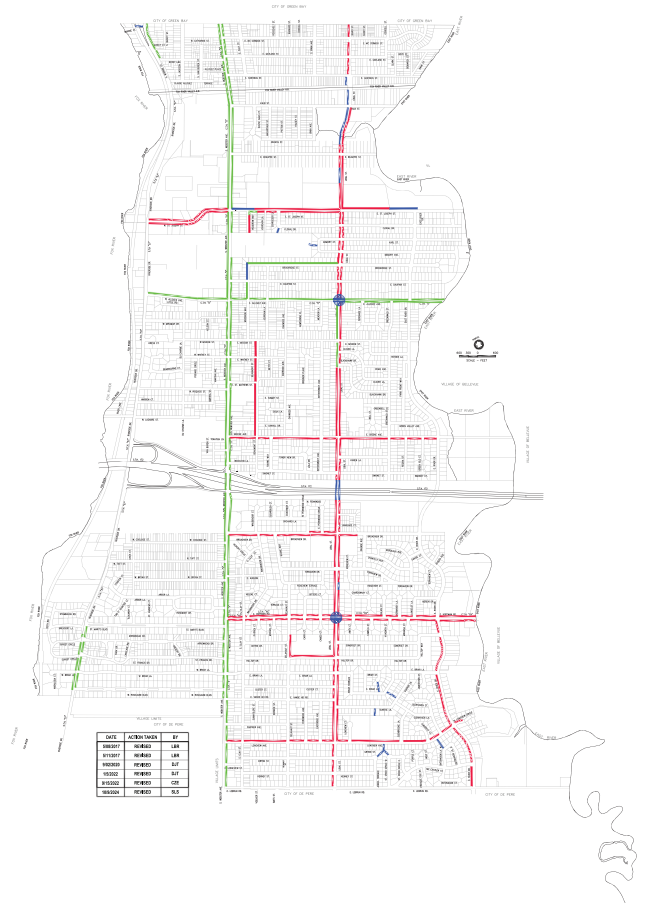
**1st Occurrence:** No Charge. Non-compliance is documented.

**2nd Occurrence:** \$50 per lot (up to 100 ft.) plus \$10 per every additional 100 ft.

**3rd Occurrence:** Two times the 1st non-compliance charge.

**4th Occurrence:** Three times the 1st non-compliance charge, plus citation for violation of sidewalk clearing ordinance 350.28.

## STORM WATER MANAGEMENT

The Village of Allouez Stormwater Utility was established in 2004 to ensure adequate funds are available for the operation and maintenance of the Village's storm sewer system. Stormwater management is required by Wisconsin Administrative Code NR 216, which requires compliance with stormwater regulations with the goal of improving the water quality of receiving waters. Further information on the stormwater program, including stormwater best management practices are available on the Village website under "Stormwater Utility".

Allouez residents can help meet the storm water management goals of the Village by doing the following:

- Minimize leaves getting into the storm sewer system by keeping them out of the street. Mulch leaves by using a mulching lawn mower, and compost leaves and reuse on your lawn.
- Use a rain barrel to collect roof downspout rain water, and use this water for your lawn and garden.
- Install a rain garden to collect roof downspout rain water and reduce the peak storm flow to the storm sewer system.
- Wash your car on the lawn rather than in your driveway. This will reduce the flow of detergent into the storm sewer.
- Clean up pet waste on your property and properly dispose of it.

The Village of Allouez has implemented an Illicit Discharge Monitoring & Control program as required by the Village's Storm Water Permit issued by the Department of Natural Resources. This program is intended to monitor the stormwater discharge at outfalls within the Village and search for non-stormwater discharges that should not be going to the storm sewer system. Residents are encouraged to report to the Village any suspicious discharges.

## FERTILIZER PHOSPHORUS BAN IN WISCONSIN

Excess phosphorus in Wisconsin's waterways has led to increased phytoplankton growth, more commonly known as algae blooms. These blooms are the easily recognizable green, thick and foul-smelling slicks on top of the waterways. These algae blooms grow quickly, then die and decay, leeching large amounts of oxygen out of the water, killing many fish in the process. Extremely high levels of phosphorus can produce colonial cyanobacteria, known as blue-green algae. Blue-green algae can release extremely deadly liver and nerve toxins that, even in small doses, can injure or kill humans and animals.

Therefore, in April 2009, Governor Jim Doyle signed the Wisconsin Zero-Phosphorus Fertilizer Law (Wisconsin Statute 94.643). This law, which took effect as of April 1 2012, restricts the use, sale and display of lawn and turf fertilizer which contains phosphorus or available phosphate. Use of this type of fertilizer is prohibited on lawns and turf in Wisconsin, except under certain exemptions.

The Phosphorus Fertilizer Ban affects homeowners, renters, and others who do lawn care, along with lawn care professionals, municipalities and local governments, and retailers who sell fertilizer in the state.

Use of fertilizer containing phosphorus or available phosphate for non-turf use is permissible. Such fertilizer may be used for agricultural production or home garden use.

The specifics of the law can be found on the Village of Allouez and Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources websites.

## STORMWATER RUNOFF

Water from rainfall or melting snow that does not soak into the ground is called stormwater runoff. Generally, in Allouez stormwater runoff flows into the municipal storm sewer of which eventually discharges into the East and Fox Rivers. During its journey to the storm sewer, stormwater runoff is polluted by fertilizers, pesticides, solvents, road salts, pet waste, and motor oils among other hazardous wastes. Polluted stormwater is the leading cause of impaired water quality in the United States which endangers local ecosystems, our drinking water, and our public health.

In an effort to preserve the quality of our waterways, the Village, to date, has constructed 7 regional stormwater ponds to treat and detain stormwater runoff prior to being discharged into local waterways. Residents can help minimize the impacts of runoff by installing rain barrels and rain gardens at their home.

## RAIN BARRELS

A simple rain barrel is typically a 55-gallon plastic barrel with an adapter in the lid for the downspout from the gutter system, a spigot installed in the lower portion of the unit, as well as an overflow valve which can flow into another barrel or rain garden. It sits under a building's downspout, and collects water from rainstorms or snow melt. This water is stored in the barrels instead of going straight into waterways or storm drains in the village. The water then can be substituted for municipal water for watering gardens and lawns.



More complex systems have filters for leaves and debris, preventative measures for mosquitoes, and multiple barrels for larger storage capacity.

## RAIN GARDENS

Rain gardens are another solution for runoff in the village. Rain gardens are specialized gardens that capture water, allowing it to slowly filter into the ground instead of running into storm drains or waterways.

A rain garden is typically a sunken garden, four to six inches deep, with a flat bottom. It can contain wild or cultivated vegetation planted specifically to aid the slow filtering of storm water into the ground. It is typically placed near a downspout for ideal water collection from storms and snow melt.

## KNOW YOUR WATER FAQs

### By the Central Brown County Water Authority



The Central Brown County Water Authority (CBCWA) is the wholesale water provider to the Village of Allouez. The CBCWA also provides water to the following member communities: De Pere, Bellevue, Howard, Lawrence, Ledgeview, and Denmark. #### Q. Where does my water come from?

A. Lake Michigan is the source of our drinking water. It is treated and pumped by Manitowoc Public Utilities (MPU) in Manitowoc, Wisconsin through a 65 mile long pipeline to each member community.

#### Q. What does CBCWA purchased water from Manitowoc, sourced from Lake Michigan, mean to residents?

A. Because of the abundance of water available from Lake Michigan, CBCWA member water utility users will not have to worry about shortages or potential water bans or curtailment of use that can put groundwater based utility systems at risk. In addition, water quality meets all state and federal water quality standards.

#### Q. What are the grains of hardness for setting my water softener?

A. Lake Michigan water has 7.5 grains of hardness. Prior to switching to Lake Michigan water, area ground water wells supplied residents with water that had a range of 13-16 grains of hardness.

#### Q. What is the fluoride level of the drinking water?

A. The Center for Disease Control (CDC) has established the "optimal level" for fluoride content in drinking water to be in the range of 0.7 mg/L to 1.2 mg/L. The fluoride level in the Authority's drinking water is maintained at the minimum recommended level of 0.7 mg/L.

## LEAD WATER SERVICES

The Village of Allouez has approximately 70 remaining lead water services. These services are segments of lead piping located within the street right of way. The Village continues to remove lead services each year and will continue to do so until completed. In addition, the Allouez Water Utility treats the water to minimize the corrosion of lead services.

The complete report on lead services is available on the Village website under the Water Utility webpage. Residents with known lead services can request to have their tap water tested by contacting the Allouez Water Department.

## WATER CONSERVING METHODS

Customers are encouraged to conserve water through use of water-conserving plumbing fixtures such as low water use toilets & shower heads. Information on water conserving appliances are available at [www.epa.gov/watersense](http://www.epa.gov/watersense), or contact your local plumbing supplier. Look for the WaterSense label on plumbing products as these are products confirmed to be low water use products.

Lawn watering is probably the greatest opportunity for water conservation. Lawn watering systems should include a moisture sensor to over-ride the watering system operation when rainfall occurs and adequate water is already available.



## Protect Your Home!

*Basement backups can be messy, aggravating, and costly. Help avoid them with a Backflow Preventer.*

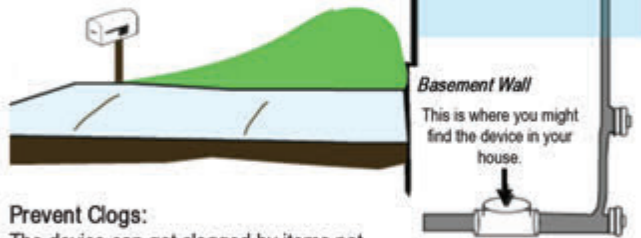
### Do You Have One?

There is a good chance your home may have one. If not, you may want to install one. But what does it look like, and where would you find it?

### Look for the Pipe:

Usually, this device is located under your basement floor, covered by a steel plate just inside the foundation wall facing the roadway. The device looks like a T-shaped pipe. A flap inside the pipe can prevent flooding happening outside your home from coming into your home. It connects your home sanitary sewer pipe to the community sewer system.

*However, if it's not maintained, it won't work!*



### Prevent Clogs:

The device can get clogged by items not designed to go down the drains - wipes, dental floss, diapers, toys, sanitary products, etc. The flap can get jammed open, making way for a basement backup.

NEW Water recommends inspecting and cleaning your device at least once a year, before the snow melt season. Heavy or extended periods of precipitation in conjunction with saturated ground conditions together can flood a community sewer system, causing unwanted backups into your home.

But with a properly operating device, you can help prevent messy waters from reaching your basement! (And remember: Please only flush the "3Ps": #1, #2, and toilet paper.)

## HOME COMPLIANCE

The Village of Allouez requires compliance with local plumbing codes.

338-11 and 350-39 of the Allouez Municipal Code require a sump pump to drain into the municipal storm sewer system, if available.

338-9 and 350-36 of the Allouez Municipal Code require the installation of a back water valve to the home's sanitary sewer lateral to protect against basement backups.

Permits are required for the installation or replacement of a water service, sanitary sewer lateral, or stormwater lateral. Permit applications are available online or in person at Village Hall.

## HOW TO READ YOUR WATER METER

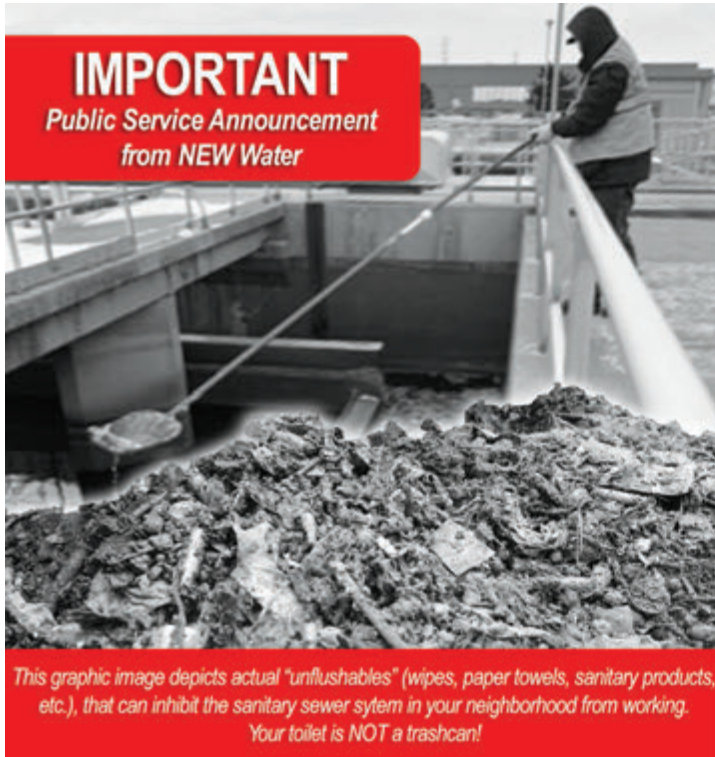
Familiarizing yourself with your water meter can prove useful when trying to identify a leak within your home.

Residential homes within the Village are equipped with a Sensus iPerl water meter. Your water meter can be found inside your home, it is likely located in the basement on the wall closest to the street. Once you've located your water meter, on the left side there is a tab, pulling up on the tab will allow you to access your reading.



Sensus iPerl meters are capable of reading down the 1/100th of a gallon, making it easy to determine if a leak is occurring in your home. Positive flow is indicated on the meter through a (+) symbol located left of "Gal". The most common leaks in homes are toilets. If you suspect you have a leaking toilet or other fixture in your home, turn off the water to that fixture (if possible) and reread your meter. If the (+) symbol has disappeared, then positive consumption has ceased and the leaking fixture has been located. Once the leak is fixed, you can resume water to the fixture and the (+) symbol will disappear, indicating no water usage.

Common household leaks include: Toilets, Whole-House Humidifier Systems, Water Softeners, and Outside Hose Bibs.



## CAN THE “UNFLUSHABLES”!

For convenience, you may be tempted to flush wipes (any kind of wipe, even those labeled “flushable”), dental floss, facial tissues, and more: Please **ONLY FLUSH THE 3Ps (Pee, Poo, and Toilet Paper)**. Anything but the 3Ps can clog pipes, cause a backup in your home, and inhibit the sanitary sewer system in your neighborhood from working. Please do your part to avoid costly repairs, to protect public health, and our most valuable resource, water.

## CROSS CONNECTION INSPECTIONS

The Village of Allouez has contracted with HydroCorp to administer the Village’s residential and commercial cross connection inspection program.

Providing and maintaining a safe public water supply is a priority of both the Village of Allouez and the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR). According to Wisconsin Administrative Code NR 810.15, SPS 382.41, and the Village of Allouez Municipal Code 350-43, the Village is required to perform a water system cross connection inspection once every 20 years for residential properties and every 2-6 years for commercial properties to ensure compliance with WDNR requirements.

With HydroCorp’s help, the Village aims to inspect approximately 300 residential and 50 commercial properties each year. Learn more about cross connection inspections on the next page.

## What is a Cross Connection?

A cross-connection is an actual or potential connection between the safe drinking water

(potable) supply and a source of contamination or pollution.

State plumbing codes require approved backflow prevention methods to be installed at every point of potable water connection and use. Cross-Connections must be properly protected or eliminated.

### HOW DOES CONTAMINATION OCCUR?

When you turn on your faucet, you expect the water to be as safe as when it left the treatment plant. However, certain hydraulic conditions left unprotected within your plumbing system may allow hazardous substances to contaminate your own drinking water or even the public water supply.

Water normally flows in one direction. However, under certain conditions, water can actually flow backwards; this is known as Backflow. There are two situations that can cause water to flow backward: backsiphonage and backpressure.

Public Awareness Content By:



**BACKSIPHONAGE**  
May occur due to a loss of pressure in the municipal water system during a fire fighting emergency, a water main break or system repair. This creates a siphon in your plumbing system which can draw water out of a sink or bucket and back into your water or the public water system.

**BACKPRESSURE**  
May be created when a source of pressure (such as a boiler) creates a pressure greater than the pressure supplied from the public water system. This may cause contaminated water to be pushed into your plumbing system through an unprotected cross-connection.



## INSIGHTS TO PROTECT YOUR DRINKING WATER

### DO...

- Keep the ends of hoses clear of all possible contaminants.
- Ensure that lawn irrigation systems have proper backflow protection.
- Verify and install a simple hose bibb vacuum breaker on all threaded faucets around your home.
- Make sure water treatment devices such as water softeners have the proper "air gap", which is a minimum of one inch above any drain.

### DON'T...

- Submerge hoses in buckets, pools, tubs, sinks or ponds.
- Use spray attachments without a backflow prevention device.
- Connect waste pipes from water softeners or other treatment systems directly to the sewer or submerged drain pipe. Always be sure there is a one-inch "air gap" separation.





## AVOIDING BACKFLOW THROUGHOUT THE HOME

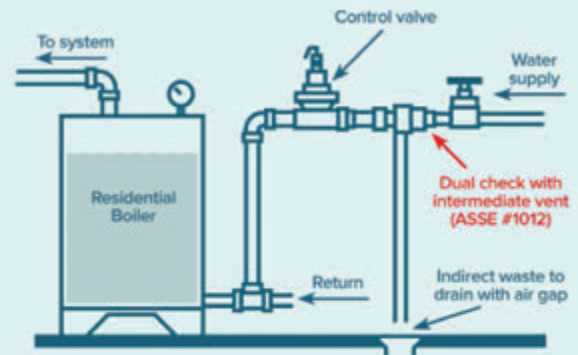


### BATHTUB & SHOWER FIXTURES

A hand-held shower fixture is compliant if:

- When shower head is hanging freely, it is at least 1" above top of the flood level rim of the bathtub
- Complies with ASSE#1014
- Has the ASME code A112.18.1 stamped on the handle

### BOILERS

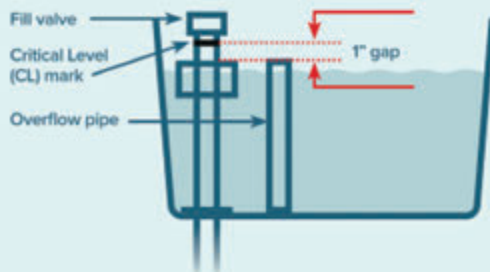


Boilers with chemical additives require an ASSE #1013 – Reduced Pressure Principle Backflow Prevention Assembly.

### TOILET TANKS

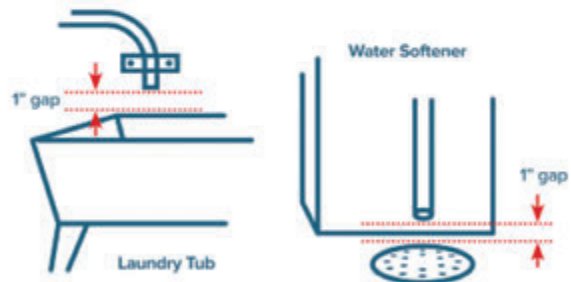
There are many unapproved toilet tank fill valve products sold at common retailers which do not meet the state plumbing code requirements for backflow prevention.

- Look for the ASSE #1002 Standard symbol on the device and packaging.
- Replace any unapproved devices with an ASSE #1002 approved anti-siphon fill valve device.
- Verify overflow tube is one inch below critical level (CL) marking on the fill valve.



### ELSEWHERE IN THE HOME

Always maintain an air gap of at least 1 inch between the end of drain hoses and the highest potential water level.

Verify all outside faucets are protected with a hose bibb vacuum breaker of the ASSE-certified types shown below.

## YOUR ALLOUEZ UTILITY INVOICE

The typical residential Village of Allouez water and sewer bill includes 5 charges: Water, Allouez Sewer, NEW Water (GBMSD) Sewer, Stormwater, and Public Fire Protection.

The Village of Allouez's Water, Public Fire Protection, and Private Fire Protection rates are regulated by the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin. Visit our website to view the Village's current utility rates.

### Water:

Water charges are applied in two ways: a volume charge and a fixed charge dependent on meter size. The rate structure used to bill residential water customers is referred to as a conservation rate. This structure provides the lowest rate to customers who use the least amount of water. Our conservation rate features three rate tiers that increase in cost after each of the following consumption thresholds are met: first 2,000 gallons used, next 8,000 gallons used, and over 10,000 gallons used per month.

Please keep in mind, that while our rates are set per thousand gallons, you are billed per hundred gallons of water used.

### Allouez Sanitary Sewage:

The Allouez Sanitary Sewage rates cover the cost of operation, maintenance, and replacement of the sanitary sewer infrastructure within the Village. This charge is applied in two ways: a volume charge and a fixed charge dependent on meter size.

### NEW Water (GBMSD) Sanitary Sewage:

The NEW Water Sanitary Sewage rates are set to recover the cost of wastewater treatment charges billed to the Village by NEW Water. This charge is applied in two ways: a volume charge and a fixed charge dependent on meter size.

### Stormwater:

Stormwater rates recover the cost of operation, maintenance, and replacement of the Village's existing and future stormwater management systems. These systems include: storm sewers, swales, wet detention ponds, roadways, waterways, and street sweeping. An Equivalent Runoff Unit (ERU) represents the average hard surface area for a residential parcel in the Village (3,663 SF).

### Public Fire Protection:

The Public Fire Protection rates recover the cost of water needed to fight fires within the Village. This charge also covers the costs associated with maintaining hydrants, water mains, and water storage facilities. This is a fixed charge based on meter size.

## OTHER CHARGES

**Reconnection Charges:** The charge for reinstalling a meter and turning on the valve at the curb stop, if necessary.

During normal business hours: \$60.00

After normal business hours: \$100.00

**Payment Not Honored by Financial Institution Charge:** \$25.00 charge when a payment rendered for utility service is not honored by the customer's financial institution.

**Special Billing Charge:** \$25.00 charge to the requestor to cover administrative expenses whenever an existing customer or property owner requests a special billing outside of the normal utility billing schedule.

# RECREATION GENERAL INFORMATION



## Village Resident

For registration and rental purposes, a resident is anyone who lives within the boundaries of the Village of Allouez and pays property taxes to the Village of Allouez.

## Non-Resident

For registration and rental purposes, a non-resident is anyone who does not reside within the boundaries of the Village of Allouez and does not pay property taxes to the Village of Allouez. In the case of non-resident participation, non-resident users contribute an additional fee or surcharge to offset their non-tax status for programs and rentals.

## Activity Changes/Schedules

Due to circumstances beyond our control, some activities may require time or location changes. All participants will be notified when possible if a change or cancellation does occur.

## Please Be Registered By Date

Persons should be registered by the date indicated. If your class does not meet the minimum enrollment by the registration deadline, it may be cancelled and/or combined with other classes. All registered participants will be notified by phone or email of the changes. Class rosters are prepared and given to instructors/site supervisors. Registration after the end date will be accepted only if openings exist and transactions must be completed IN-PERSON (unless otherwise indicated) as you will receive a receipt to take to your first session (proof of registration).

## Refund Policy

Refund of fees for programs/facilities shall be made under the following conditions:

Refunds for cash, check or card payments will be made by check. Please allow two to four weeks for the refund to arrive.

## Park & Recreation Department cancels the program:

Persons registered for a program which is canceled by the department (i.e. lack of enrollment) shall receive a full refund of program fees or credit for a future program, whichever the registrant prefers.

**Participants Cancel program(s):** Cancellations can be made up to two weeks prior to the start of a program unless otherwise indicated. Cancellations must be made in the form of an email to [recreation@villageofallouezwi.gov](mailto:recreation@villageofallouezwi.gov). If a participant withdraws from a program, a

minimum processing fee of \$5.00 will be deducted from the refund. **NO refund or credits** will be issued once a class has started.

**Rental Cancellation(s)** In the event of a cancellation, a \$40 cancellation fee will be charged for any cancelled reservations occurring 15 working days prior to the reservation date. Any cancellation occurring less than 10 working days prior to the reservation date will forfeit the full rental amount, but will be refunded the security deposit. If you need to cancel you must email [recreation@villageofallouezwi.gov](mailto:recreation@villageofallouezwi.gov) or call 920-448-2804.

## Waiting List

If your desired program is filled, you will be notified and placed on a waiting list. The Parks & Recreation department will make every effort to accommodate those on the waiting list. If any opening becomes available, we will go in the order of the waitlist.

## Lost/Stolen Items

The Recreation Department is not responsible for personal equipment, clothes, etc. that are lost or stolen during participation in any sponsored activity. However, please contact our office concerning lost items as many times they are turned in by others.

## Photo Policy

Photos and video footage are periodically taken of people participating in village activity, events or visiting facilities. If you do not wish to have your photo taken, please notify the photographer and/or class instructor. Photos may be used in publication, social media and/or website.

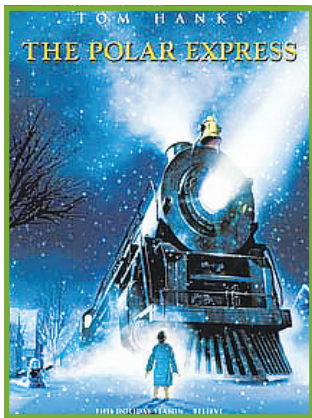

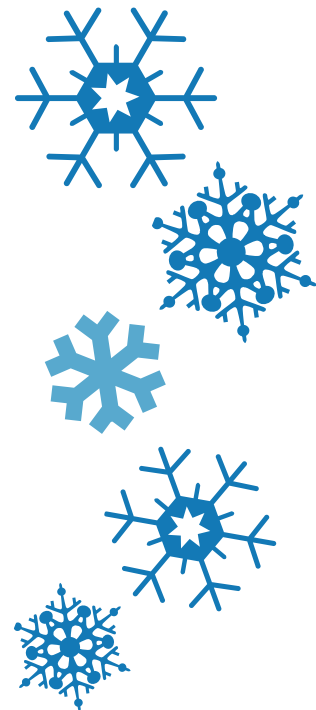


## SLEDDING HILL

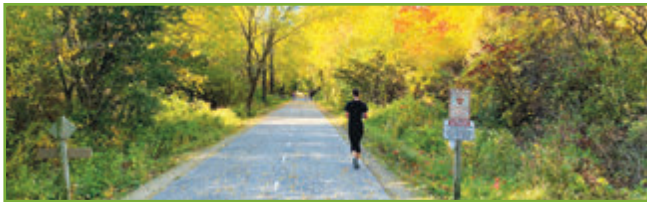
# PARKS AND FORESTRY

## RESCH FAMILY EAST RIVER TRAIL

This 2.3 mile recreational trail starts at Green Isle Park and follows the East River south to Wiese Park in Allouez. It is available for nature lovers, walkers, joggers, bicyclists, skaters, and fishing enthusiasts throughout the year.

## ALLOUEZ TRAIL CONNECTION

This ½ mile east-west paved trail connects the Fox River Trail with Webster Avenue. It runs between Heritage Hill State Park and Highway 172 with a pedestrian crossing at Riverside Drive. Users can cross Webster Avenue at Greene Avenue in front of Heritage Hill.



## FOX RIVER STATE RECREATION TRAIL

The Fox River State Recreation Trail runs along the Fox River. A state trail pass is required for all people age 16 or older, to enjoy the Fox River Trail for biking, while a walking or hiking a pass is not needed. Annual trail passes can be purchased at the Allouez Village Hall or through Brown County Parks.

### Keep Parks Clean

Trash should be placed in the appropriate receptacles in the park or carried out with you. Keeping the parks safe and clean is everyone's responsibility. Let's work on this together.



### No Smoking in Allouez Parks

Smoking and use of electronic smoking devices is prohibited in all Village parks and trails per Article IV of Chapter 195 of the Village Code. Violators may be subject to municipal citations and fines.



## PETS IN ALLOUEZ PARKS

Dogs and cats on a 6-foot leash are allowed in village parks. Some spaces within the parks are off limits, including park buildings, ball diamonds, and near playground equipment.

The pet owner or custodian must immediately clean up all waste or defecation and properly dispose of it. The person walking the pet shall have in their possession equipment or bags to properly clean up all waste generated by the animal. Failure of a person to abide by these ordinances could result in a fine, loss of driver's license, and /or jail time.

## TRAIL RULES:

- Operation of off-road vehicles, mini bikes, ATV/UTV, snowmobiles, or similar vehicles are not allowed
- E-bikes are allowed as long as they are equipped with fully operative pedals for propulsion by human power and observe a 10 mile per hour speed limit
- Dogs are allowed on the trail and must be leashed and under control at all times
- Please report violations to the Brown County Sherrif's Department at 920-391-7450

## TRAIL ETIQUETTE:

- Trail users should keep right- please remain in your lane of travel and be courteous to other trail users
- Pass slower traffic on their left; yield to oncoming traffic when passing
- Slow down and use voice or bell to warn others as you pass
- Treat all users with respect and courtesy regardless of their sport, speed, or skill level

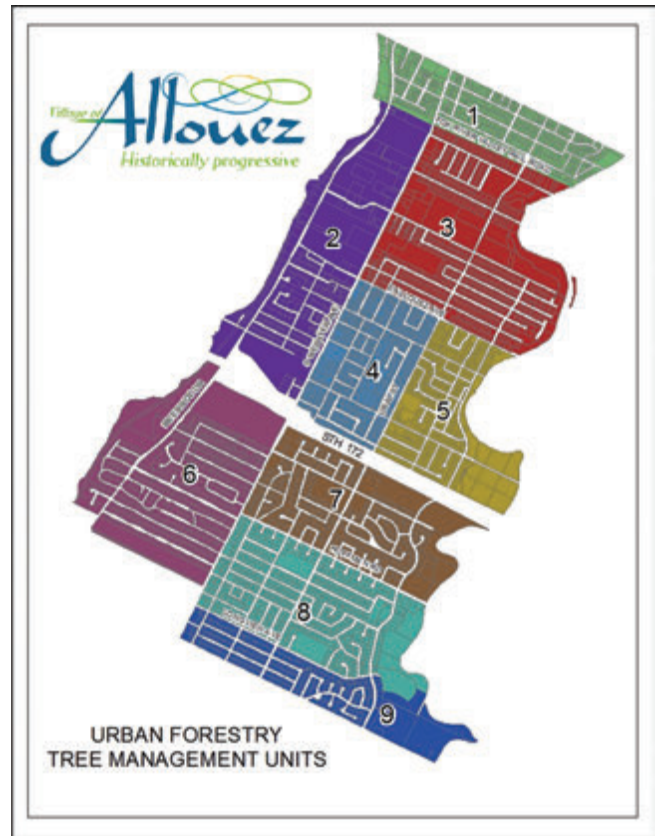

## STREET TREE INFORMATION

The Village of Allouez Parks, Recreation, and Forestry Department maintains all street trees that grow within the street right-of-way throughout the community. Per Chapter 404 of the Village of Allouez Code of Ordinances.

The Department maintains all of the street trees utilizing a Tree Pruning Plan. The Village is divided into 9 different forest management units for management, maintenance, and to increased efficiency by reducing crew travel time to a minimum.



## TREE MAINTENANCE

Tree pruning for clearances over roadways, sidewalks, obstacles, and for vision follow these minimum standards for the safety and wellbeing of motorists and pedestrians.

Sidewalk	10 feet
Building	10 feet

Vision Triangle	30 foot minimum



## EMERALD ASH BORER INFORMATION

Allouez has seen widespread tree infestation and mortality due to emerald ash borers (EAB) on public and private properties in the last few years. For additional information on EAB visit the Village of Allouez Forestry webpage at :

## PUBLIC TREES

The Village Forestry Department continues ash tree removals of infested trees along the streets and other public properties within the community. The Department will contact adjacent property owners prior to removal of a street tree, will schedule the removal and restoration of the tree stump, and provide a replacement tree if space allows. Please contact the Department if you see a street tree that is showing signs of infestation.

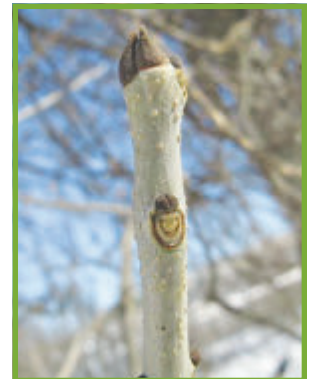
## PRIVATE PROPERTY TREES

Trees that become infested will begin dying from the top of the tree down. They can become a hazard to homeowners, their neighbors, and the general public. Proactive care or removal can be much more cost effective than waiting until a tree is completely dead. **It is the responsibility of the property owner to maintain and mitigate any nuisance, sick, or hazardous tree per village code 404-5.** If left unchecked, the property owner could be liable for damages or subject to municipal citations.

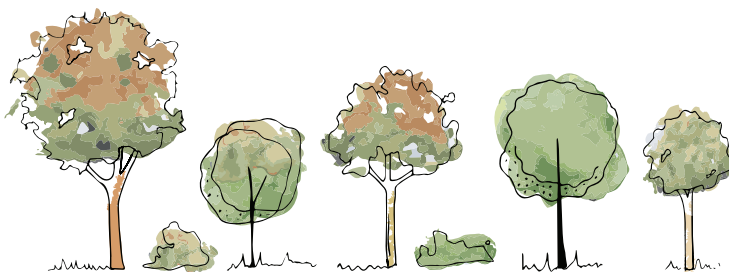
The Village does not have assistance programs for tree removals on private property.
